Rider University was named to U.S. News and World Report's Best Colleges list and the Wall Street Journal's Top U.S. College list. Rider was included in the top quarter of the top 179 regional colleges in the North by U.S. News and one of the top 400 colleges in the United States by the Wall Street Journal. Rider also earned additional accolades from U.S. News in a number of categories in the north region. Rider was ranked number 28 in Best Values Schools, number 21 in most innovative school and number 96 in Top Performers on Social Mobility. These rankings are a testament to the value of a Rider education and the positive impact our university has on enriching student life, says Rider President Gregory G. Dell'Orto, Ph.D. They are also a great measure of our performance as an institution and the dedicated work of our faculty and staff helping students achieve their goals. U.S. News and World Report uses 15 performance measures that range from results to expert opinions to outstanding students. The Wall Street Journal's ranking also uses 15 individual performance metrics and groups them into four categories: resources, engagement, environment, and results. About 20% of the rankings are derived from the annual Times Higher Education U.S. Student Survey, which includes data from more than 170,000 current U.S. students across all ranked colleges. Rider gives students the freedom to explore their passions and interests with more than 100 majors and minors, many of which are complementary. With the launch of the Engaged Learning Program in 2017, Rider students are able to update what every graduate of the university knows to be – the best way to learn is by doing so. Through their hard work and the support of our community, Rider students are achieving things they may never have thought possible, Dell'Orto says. Our faculty and staff foster an environment that encourages exploration so that students can understand and reach their potential. At Rider, students are required to complete at least two high-impact involved learning experiences, such as study abroad or supervised research, to meet their graduation requirements. These experiences are documented on an Engaged Learning Transcript that is earned alongside an academic transcript, showing that graduate schools and future employers have the breadth of their undergraduate experience. This year, more than 950 new students, including transfer students, chose Rider as the next step in their academic journey. The incoming class of 2023 is the most diverse in rider history. This means that for every 100 students who signed up, 70 students were admitted, making Rider's admissions process somewhat competitive. Applicants for Rider can submit SAT or ACT scores to the school, but they are not required. During the 2017-2018 admissions cycle, 92% of admitted students submitted SAT scores. SAT Range (Admitted Students) Section 25th Percentile 75th Percentile ERW 500 600 Math 500 590 ERW=Evidence-Based Reading and Writing These admissions data tells us that of the students who submitted scores during the 2017-18 admissions cycle, most of rider's admitted students fall within the top 35% nationally on the SAT. For the evidence-based reading and writing section, 50% of admitted Rider students scored between 500 and 600, while 25% scored below 500 and 25% scored above 600. On the maths section, 50% of admitted students scored between 500 and 590, while 25% scored under 500 and 25% scored above 590. While the SAT is not required, this data tells us that a composite SAT score of 1190 or higher is competitive for Rider. Rider University does not require SAT scores for admission. For students who choose to submit scores, note that Rider participates in the scorechoice program, meaning that the admissions office will consider your highest score of each individual section on all SAT test dates. Rider does not require the essay portion of the SAT or SAT Tests. Rider University has a test-optional standardized test policy. Applicants for Rider can submit SAT or ACT scores to the school, but they are not required. During the 2017-2018 admission cycle, 16% of the submitted ACT scores. The middle 50% of students admitted to Rider got a composite ACT score between 20 and 25, while 25% scored above 25 and 25% scored under 20. Note that Rider does not require ACT scores for admission. For students who choose to submit scores, Rider participates in the scorechoice program, which means the admissions office will consider your highest score of each individual section across all ACT test dates. Rider does not require the ACT writing section. In 2019, the average GPA high school for rider university's incoming freshman class was 3.32. Rider University, which accepts less than three-quarters of applicants, has a somewhat competitive admissions pool. However, Rider also has a holistic admissions process and is test-optional, and admissions decisions are based on much more than numbers. A strong application essay and glowing letters of recommendation can strengthen your application, as can participation in meaningful extracurricular activities and a rigorous course schedule. The college is looking for students who will contribute meaningfully to the campus community, not just students who show promise in the classroom. Students with particularly engaging stories or accomplishments can still receive serious attention, even if their grades and scores fall outside Rider's average reach. Successful applicants typically had SAT scores (ERW+M) of 1000 or higher, an ACT composite of 20 or higher, and a high school average in the B range or better. Standardized test scores are not as important as grades because the university has test-optional admissions.
